

## **Worthington Assistant City Manager Appointed President of The Ohio City/County Management Association**

Worthington Assistant City Manager, Robyn Stewart, was recently appointed the president of the Ohio City/County Management Association and assumed the role on July 1, 2018. She previously served as vice president of the organization.



Stewart has served as Assistant City Manager for Worthington, Ohio for the past nine years. In this role, she oversees the economic development, public information, city clerk and information technology functions of the city government. She also manages city-wide projects and initiatives, including the capital improvements plan, strategic and business planning, and new initiatives identified by the City Council.

Prior to her position with the City of Worthington, Ms. Stewart served as Assistant City Manager and Assistant to the City Manager/Public Information Officer for the City of Leavenworth, Kansas. While Assistant City Manager, she focused on city-wide initiatives and projects, oversaw the City's communications function, served as the City's liaison to the U.S. Army's Fort Leavenworth, and managed the contract for fixed base operator services at the airport. She served as Interim City Manager for nine months during a transition in city managers and as Interim Personnel Director during a leave of absence for the department director. As Assistant to the City Manager/Public Information Officer, Ms. Stewart handled special projects and managed all of the City's communication efforts including media relations, the local government public access cable channel, website and resident newsletter.

Earlier in her career, Ms. Stewart served as Management Assistant in the Public Works Department for the City of Overland Park, Kansas, and as a local government management consultant. While completing her degrees, she interned with the Budget Office in Johnson County, Kansas; the Municipal Services Department in City of Olathe, Kansas; and in the City Manager's Office and the Department of Development in the City of Springfield, Ohio. Ms. Stewart has a Master of Public Administration degree from the University of Kansas and a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science with a Minor in Economics from Wittenberg University.
